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## **ABSTRACT**

This file provides a template for writing papers for the 2021 NSK conference. Please format your Conference Proceedings paper according to the following guidelines, style checklist and paper template, and submit it through the online submission system (EasyChair) or directly to [hpcc.editor@nsk.hr](mailto:hpcc.editor@nsk.hr) if necessary. Please note the following details: this template is an A4 format with 2.5cm (0.98 inch) margins left, right, top and bottom. Paragraphs should be single spaced, with space between paragraphs (instead of line indentation). Please avoid the use of footnotes. Papers should be not longer than 6000 words and not shorter than 3000, single-spaced, with Calibri font, 12 point size. For your paper to be accepted it must be formatted as a Microsoft Word file (.doc or .rtf), 10 MB or less in size, including pictures & diagrams and should be written in compliance with these instructions.

Each paper must be original and unpublished work, not submitted for publication elsewhere (copyright problems fall entirely under responsibility of the authors). The submitted paper will be submitted to the reviewing process. Each paper will be reviewed by at least two experts in the relevant field ensuring the publication of only top quality contributions.

A proceedings paper consists of a title; an author byline and affiliation; an abstract; the text with optional tables and figures; a conclusion; the references; and a short author bio. Acknowledgements, appendixes, and notations are optional.

An abstract with 200-300 words should appear on the first page, after the name(s) of the author(s) and the contact information of the corresponding author(s). The abstract should present a concise statement of the scope, principal findings, and conclusions of the paper. Abstracts cannot include lists, tables, figures or references.

Papers that do not follow these guidelines will be returned for editing.

## **1. INTRODUCTION [this is formatted as Heading 2]**

Introduction should describe the nature of the problem and current state of knowledge; give the statement of the purpose, scope and general methods, and present hypothesis and/or research goals. Paper should demonstrate an adequate understanding of the relevant literature in the field and cite an appropriate range of literature sources.

The introduction should state clearly the objective of the paper as well as context of the investigation. The literature review should be limited to the articles, books and other items that are relevant to specific research questions addressed. The theoretical framework of the research may contain a full section explaining motives of the research, identifying a gap in the existing literature of the research, and potential usefulness of proposed theoretical basis.

### **1.1. Language [this is formatted as Heading 3]**

When writing the paper please remember to use either British, or US, spelling but not a mix of the two, i.e., if you choose British spelling it would be colour not color; behaviour (behavioural) not behavior; [school] programme not program; [he] practises not practices; centre not center; organization not organisation; analyse not analyze, etc.

### **1.2. Acronyms**

All acronyms should be spelled out the first time they are introduced in text or references. Thereafter the acronym can be used if appropriate, e.g. 'The work for the Organization of United Nations (OUN)...'. Subsequently, 'The OUN studies on...', in a reference ... (Organization of United Nations [OUN] 1989).

## **2. METHODOLOGY**

The empirical section should provide appropriate citations to the methodology used. Paper's argument should be built on an appropriate base of theory, concepts, or other ideas. The research or equivalent intellectual work on which the paper is based should be well designed. Methods employed should be appropriate.

### **2.1. Citations**

The whole citation should follow the Harvard style, enclosed within parentheses (author surname, year) if not a natural part of the surrounding sentence; the year should be enclosed within parentheses if the names do form a natural part of the surrounding sentence. Citations of works by two authors should have 'and' (not an ampersand) between the names. Citations of works by three or more authors should have the first author followed by *et al* in italics with no trailing stop.

In-text lists of references should be listed in chronological order (e.g. author1, 2002, author2, 2004, author3, 2008). Publications by the same author(s) in the same year should be identified with a, b, c (e.g. 2008a, 2008b) closed up to the year. If more than one authors is referenced, use first author and "*et al.*". Any direct quotation, regardless of length, must be accompanied by a reference citation that includes a page number. A reference list should appear at the end of the paper under the heading "References".

## 2.2. Tables and figures

Tables and figures must be embedded in the paper text, close to the location of their first appearance. All tables and figures must be referred to in text as follows: Figure 1, Table 1, i.e. 'As seen in Table [or Figure] 1 ...' (not tab., fig. or Fig). All figures must be numbered in the order in which they appear in the paper (e.g. Figure 1, Figure 2). Please ensure that tables do not split over the page. Figures should have minimum resolution of 300 dpi. Each figure should have a title and a number.

## 2.3. Titles of tables and figures

Each table should have a descriptive title (using the current style) and each column an appropriate heading. Each table and/or figure must have a title that explains its purpose without reference to the text. Do not type the caption to a figure on that figure; the legends to any illustrations must be typed separately following the main text and should be grouped together. Table legends must be placed above the table; diagram or figure legends below the diagram or figure. Tables should be formatted as Table 1 (below): left justified text for first column and centred columns thereafter, if possible. Only horizontal table grid lines should be used. Add one empty paragraph of the [ Paragraph] style following a table.

All figures must be inserted in a JPEG image format, within the page margins. Centre images. Do not insert loose objects such as arrows, lines, or text boxes. Number and caption below the figure (Figure 1: Caption), centre aligned.

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### **3. RESULTS**

Full details of the analyses and results must be included in the paper itself. Results should be presented clearly and analysed appropriately. Conclusions should adequately tie together the other elements of the paper.

### **4. DISCUSSION**

Authors should provide brief discussion. The research question should be answered. Authors should note limitations of the study. Results should clearly express its case, measured against the technical language of the field and the expected knowledge of the journal's readership. Attention has to be paid to the clarity of expression and readability, such as sentence structure, jargon use, acronyms, etc.

### **5. CONCLUSION**

Conclusion should be based on answering research questions and/or should include results of hypothesis investigation. Further research directions should be proposed.

### **6. ACKNOWLEDGMENTS (IF ANY):**

Put acknowledgments here (max. 150 words).

### **7. REFERENCES**

All the references should be arranged in alphabetical order. Use Harvard style for reference. References should not be numbered or bulleted. Citation not older than the last decade should be used as much as possible. Please follow the examples below.
